Pre-visit



Getting To Amazon Flooded Forest



From the entrance, make a right turn and take a 10-minute stroll along the sheltered walkway to Amazon Flooded Forest.

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During Visit

word game



Hone language and literacy skills while observing the giant river otters. Prompt your children to think of words.

Additional activity:

Choose a buddy and pair up.

- One child to say a word or phrase relating to the otter e.g. 'furry'. The buddy responds with the first word that comes to mind. Does the word apply to an otter?
- 2. The buddy's turn to repeat the above activity. Get the pair to discuss if the words apply to the otter.
- 3. Continue taking turns to have fun with words and expand your children's vocabulary.



Use the See-Think-Wonder Thinking Routine to keep your children focused on the biggest animal in the manatee exhibit.

Allocate time:

- 1. Encourage your children to practise mindfulness by taking time to observe the manatees quietly.
- 2. Pique their curiosity by encouraging them to ask questions about these beautiful aquatic mammals.

Additional prompting questions:

- 3. What vegetables do you see the manatees eating?
- 4. How much vegetables do you think they eat?
- 5. I wonder if they poop as much as they eat, and how might the aquarist clean them up.



Use riddles to encourage students to practise observation skills and identify various animals.

Additional game:

I Spy with My Little Eye

Find a partner and encourage children to play I Spy with each other while observing the exhibits.

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Word Bank

Here are some words that might be new to your class.

Essential Agreements

Simple guidelines to regulate your children's behaviour that you get your class to agree to.

Flippers

Flippers are modified limbs of animals. Broad and flat, flippers provide power to help aquatic animals swim fast.

Habitat

A habitat is the home of animals. It's a place where they live and find everything they need - food, water, a safe place to rest and play. Different animals live in different habitats such as forests, grasslands, wetlands, oceans, and others.

Humongous, Gigantic, Ginormous, Enormous, Massive

All these words mean something that is extremely large. They are used to describe things that are much bigger than usual.

Aquatic

When we say something is aquatic, it means that it is associated with water. Aquatic animals are animals that live in water for most or all of their lives. There are aquatic plants too.

Riddle

A riddle is a tricky question that makes you think. It's like playing a guessing game with words.


Scales

Most fish have scales as body coverings to protect their soft body. Overlapping fish scales also help fish to swim by reducing friction with water.

Extend learning in your classroom

1. The Otter Song

Sing along to this and move like an otter

Otter Song by Lotty Friends

Lyrics

(Verse 1) I'm a baby otter, I love fresh water. Five little toes on my webbed feet. I'm long and slim And have a long tail— Swimming is so much fun, Zoom, zoom, zoom!

(Chorus) Otter, Otter, Otters! Let's dance in the water. Otters, Otters, Otters! Let's call the others! (Verse 2) I'm a mummy otter, I love night-time. Moving in the dark, Searching for my prey. I have long whiskers and pointy teeth— Fishing is so much fun, Yum, yum, yum!

(Chorus x2) Otter, Otter, Otters! Let's dance in the water. Otters, Otters, Otters! Let's call the others!

2. Playdough Fun

After visiting Amazon Flooded Forest, ask your children to choose a favourite animal. Provide children with playdough and encourage them to create their favourite animal. Pay attention to the details of how the animals look.

Prompting questions:

- What body parts help the animal to move in the water?
- What body covering does the animal have? Does it have fur, scales, or skin?
- What colours does the animal have on its body?
